Nathan Burns, known as Mr Metacognition, is a leading UK expert on metacognition who works with schools and education organisations worldwide to improve classroom practice. A former pastoral leader, More Able coordinator, metacognition lead and Head of Maths, he authored Inspiring Deep Learning and Teaching Hacks on practical applications of metacognition. Now focused on professional development, he delivers training across the UK and with Teach First, Ambition Institute, and the Maths Hubs, regularly presenting research at conferences and online.

Kate Jones is an experienced teacher, leader, bestselling author, blogger and award-winning international speaker. She is currently Senior Associate for Teaching and Learning at Evidence Based Education and the author of over ten books, including a bestselling series on retrieval practice. Kate was also the editor of The ResearchEd Guide to Cognitive Science, and her latest book focused on evidence-informed and workload-friendly feedback strategies to support teacher workload and student progress. Kate writes extensively about education in various educational magazines, including Teach Middle East Magazine and the TES and is also the founder of The Love To Teach Podcast. Professor Daniel Muijs is Head of the School of Social Sciences, Education and Social Work and Professor of Education at Queen's University Belfast. He co-edits School Effectiveness and School Improvement and is Executive Editor of Education Sciences. A former Deputy Director for Research and Evaluation at Ofsted, he led its curriculum research Professor programme. Mujis has held professorial/leadership roles at Academica University of Applied Sciences and the universities of Southampton, Manchester, and Newcastle, and is currently leading a rewrite of the Flemish national curriculum goals for primary and early years. He holds a PhD (Social Sciences), MSc (Managerial Economics), and BA (Communication Sciences) from the KU Leuven.

Dr Caitlin Donnelly is a Reader in Education in the School of Social Sciences, Education and Social Work (SSESW) at Queen's University Belfast. She undertakes qualitative research to advance understanding of the role of schools in divided societies. Dr Donnelly's published work centres on two core areas: Educational Policy—particularly neo-liberalism and managerialism and their effects on educational policy and governance in Northern Ireland and beyond—and Education in Divided Societies—with a focus on how schools can challenge societal division. She has conducted research on school ethos to develop greater conceptual clarity and has published extensively on how schools can either promote or impede more positive relations between groups divided by religious belief, political persuasion, and cultural tradition. She teaches education policy on the Master's in Education programme.







Shauna McLaughlin has taught English and English Literature for 21 years. She spent four years seconded to CCEA as Education Manager for English and Literacy, and continues to work for them as an associate writer, researcher and reviser. During her time there Shauna became a Fellow of the Winston Churchill Memorial Trust after extensive research in New York and Boston on school curriculums and pedagogies designed to close the socioeconomic achievement gap. On returning to St. Dominic's she spent seven years as an associate lecturer in Queen's Belfast, and is now a part-time English tutor with The Fostering Network. Shauna is also an educational consultant at the BBC writing the Bitesize content for GCSE and A-level English Literature. Outside of education, Shauna is a music writer for The Thin Air, Ireland's music and culture guide and uses her effective questioning skills to host live Q&As with writers and musicians for Arts organisations such as Cathedral Quarter Arts Festival.

Philip McMaster is Vice-Principal for Curriculum and School Improvement at St Dominic's Grammar School for Girls. With more than 16 years' experience across a range of school contexts, he began his career in all-boys, nonselective post-primary schools in North and West Belfast. After six years, he joined a rural co-educational grammar school, serving as Head of Department, Head of Year and Senior Leader, before returning to West Belfast to take up his current post on the Falls Road.
